Planning



The Harmony Specific Plan received a recommendation for approval by the Planning Commission at their May 3rd public hearing. The meeting was the third in a series of hearings to consider the master planned community proposed to construct 3,632 homes, parks, trails, a fire station and host an elementary school site. The project is located at the City's most easterly boundary, north of Mill Creek and east of the Greenspot bridge. The project entitlements include a Specific Plan, EIR, Development Agreement, and two Tract Map facilitated by a General Plan Amendment and Zone Change. After receiving additional presentations regarding traffic and grading related issues, the Commission deliberated for more than two hours. They provided detailed comments to the City Council regarding proposed amendments to the Specific Plan and Development Agreement. The City Council is expected to consider the project in June.

BIKE MONTH



May is National Bike Month which includes an ever-expanding diversity of events in communities nationwide — but the biggest day of the month is Bike to Work Day. In 2016, Bike to Work Week will be May 16-20, with Bike to Work Day on May 20. Everyone is encouraged to bike to school and work during the month of May.

40% of all trips in the U.S. are less than two miles, making bicycling a feasible and fun way to get to work. With increased interest in healthy, sustainable and economic transportation options, it's not surprising that, from 2000 to 2013, the number of bicycle commuters in the U.S. grew by more than 62 percent. Hundreds of American communities have been successful in increasing bicycle commuting by providing Bike to Work Week and Bike to Work Day events as well as Bike to School Day. The National Center for Safe Routes to School hosts National Bike to School Day the second week of May.

BLOOD DRIVE



Emergency Preparedness - Family Communications

Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so plan how you will contact one another. Think about how you will communicate in different situations.

Complete a contact card for each adult family member. Have them keep these cards handy in a wallet, purse or briefcase, etc. Additionally, complete contact cards for each child in your family. Put the cards in their backpacks or book bags.

Check with your children’s day care or school. Facilities designed for children should include identification planning as part of their emergency plans.

Family Communication Tips

Identify a contact such as a friend or relative who lives out-of-state for household members to notify they are safe. It may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members.

Be sure every member of your family knows the phone number and has a cell phone, coins or a pre-paid phone card to call the emergency contact. If you have a cell phone, program that person(s) as "ICE" (In Case of Emergency) in your phone. If you are in an accident, emergency personnel will often check your ICE listings in order to get a hold of someone you know. Make sure to tell your family and friends that you’ve listed them as emergency contacts.
