Important Public Notice — ALL FIREWORKS PROHIBITED

Highland Police and Fire Departments wish to remind you that fireworks (safe and sane included) are not permitted within the City of Highland. It is a violation to own, use or sell any type of fireworks within the City of Highland. Use of fireworks may result in citation and fine up to \$1,000; or arrest.

The Highland Police and Fire Departments will have extra officers working over the July 4th Holiday period. Fireworks will be confiscated and violators may be cited or arrested. Possession of explosive devices exceeding 50 milligrams is a felony.

Individuals may be held liable for damages (and parents may be held liable for damages caused by their children) resulting from use of fireworks and for costs of a response by the Fire or Police Departments.

There are many public firework displays planned throughout the area. Immanuel Baptist Church in the City of Highland will offer a free public firework show on July 4th. The City of Highland urges residents to attend these celebrations.



HEALTHY HIGHLAND

We all need to take safety precautions to stay healthy during the summer when temperatures are at their highest. There are several types of illnesses that can be brought on by heat stress. Be aware of the signs and symptoms and know what to do in case you or someone you know becomes sick.

HEAT STRESS – TYPES OF HEAT RELATED ILLNESSES:

HEAT STROKE

Heat stroke is the most serious heat-related illness. It occurs when the body becomes unable to control its temperature: the body's temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails, and the body is unable to cool down. When heat stroke occurs, the body temperature can rise to 106°F or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not given.

Symptoms of heat stroke include:

- Confusion, altered mental status, slurred speech
- Loss of consciousness (coma)
- Hot, dry skin or profuse sweating
- Seizures
- Very high body temperature
- Fatal if treatment delayed

First Aid— Take the following steps to treat a worker with heat stroke:

- Call 911 for emergency medical care.
- Stay with worker until emergency medical services arrive.
- Move the worker to a shaded, cool area and remove outer clothing.
- Cool the worker quickly with a cold water or ice bath if possible; wet the skin, place cold wet cloths on skin, or soak clothing with cool water.
- Circulate the air around the worker to speed cooling.
- Place cold wet cloths or ice on head, neck, armpits, and groin; or soak the clothing with cool water.

HEAT EXHAUSTION

Heat exhaustion is the body's response to an excessive loss of the water and salt, usually through excessive sweating. Workers most prone to heat exhaustion are those that are elderly, have high blood pressure, and those working in a hot environment.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include:

- Headache
- Nausea
- Dizziness
- Weakness
- Irritability
- Thirst
- Heavy sweating
- Elevated body temperature



First Aid — Treat a worker suffering from heat exhaustion with the following:

- Take worker to a clinic or emergency room for medical evaluation and treatment.
- If medical care is unavailable, call 911.
- Someone should stay with worker until help arrives.
- Remove worker from hot area and give liquids to drink.
- Remove unnecessary clothing, including shoes and socks.
- Cool the worker with cold compresses or have the worker wash head, face, and neck with cold water.
- Encourage frequent sips of cool water.

RHABDOMYOLYSIS

Rhabdomyolysis is a medical condition associated with heat stress and prolonged physical exertion, resulting in the rapid breakdown, rupture, and death of muscle. When muscle tissue dies, electrolytes and large proteins are released into the bloodstream that can cause irregular heart rhythms and seizures, and damage the kidneys.

Symptoms of rhabdomyolysis include:

- Muscle cramps/pain
- Abnormally dark (tea or cola colored) urine
- Weakness
- Exercise intolerance
- Asymptomatic

First Aid—Workers with symptoms of rhabdomyolysis should:

- Stop activity
- Increase oral hydration (water preferred)
- Seek immediate care at the nearest medical facility
- Ask to be checked for rhabdomyolysis (i.e., blood sample analyzed for creatine kinase)

HEAT SYNCOPE

Heat syncope is a fainting (syncope) episode or dizziness that usually occurs with prolonged standing or sudden rising from a sitting or lying position. Factors that may contribute to heat syncope include dehydration and lack of acclimatization.

Symptoms — Symptoms of heat syncope include:

- Fainting (short duration)
- Dizziness
- Light-headedness during prolonged standing or suddenly rising from a sitting or lying position

First Aid—Workers with heat syncope should:

- Sit or lie down in a cool place.
- Slowly drink water, clear juice, or a sports drink.



HEAT CRAMPS

Heat cramps usually affect workers who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture levels. Low salt levels in muscles causes painful cramps. Heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion.

Symptoms of Heat Cramps include:

- Muscle cramps, pain, or spasms in the abdomen, arms, or legs

First Aid — Workers with heat cramps should:

- Drink water and have a snack and/or carbohydrate-electrolyte replacement liquid (e.g., sports drinks) every 15 to 20 minutes
- Avoid salt tablets
- Get medical help if the worker has heart problems, is on a low sodium diet, or if cramps do not subside within 1 hour

HEAT RASH

Heat rash is a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather.

Symptoms of heat rash include:

- Looks like red cluster of pimples or small blisters
- Usually appears on the neck, upper chest, groin, under the breasts, and in elbow creases

First Aid— Workers experiencing heat rash should:

- When possible, a cooler, less humid work environment is best treatment
- Keep rash area dry
- Powder may be applied to increase comfort
- Ointments and creams should not be used

Public Works



Base Line Safety Improvements

Construction of safety improvements on Base Line between SR-210 and Boulder Avenue will begin Tuesday, July 5, 2016 and continue through November 2016. This safety improvement project will construct a new center landscaped median on Base Line between Seine Avenue and Boulder Avenue, extend the dual eastbound left-turn lanes at Boulder Avenue across Stoney Creek Drive, widen the south side of Base Line to add an eastbound right-turn pocket at Seine Avenue, widen the west side of Seine Avenue to add another northbound left-turn lane at Base Line, remove the existing frontage road on the north and west side of the ARCO gas station, and rehabilitate existing pavement on Base Line from SR-210 to Boulder Avenue. The construction cost is \$873,300, which is funded by a combination of a Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program Grant and City Funds.

The contractor will place changeable message signs on Base Line on Monday, June 27, 2016 to alert motorists of the upcoming construction. During construction, businesses and residents may experience certain inconveniences such as traffic delays, temporary loss of parking, and access restriction. Base Line will remain open during construction with a minimum of one lane open for both directions.

Planning

Highland Park Planned Development Approved

The Highland Park Planned Development project, by Mastercraft Homes Group, with its 46 lot subdivision and design guidelines, was endorsed by the Planning Commission in May and approved by the City Council on June 14, 2016. This project subdivides a 7.6 acre parcel, on the north side of Base Line between Club View Drive and Weaver Street, and was adopted via a conditional use permit, a general plan amendment, zone change, tentative tract map, and an environment assessment.

This project complies with the requirements for Planned Development by providing a greater level of community amenities and cohesiveness through distinctive architectural styles proposed in the design guidelines, and creating a more desirable living environment by offering single-family lots, the creation of a tight knit neighborhood with a 0.44 acre community park, landscaped buffers, and a pedestrian friendly neighborhood design permitting more neighborhood interactions.

Now that this project has been approved, Mastercraft Homes Group is working on the single family home plans for review and approval by the Planning Commission. The approved design guidelines permit Traditional, Cottage, and Spanish architectural styles. The size of the 2-story homes is expected to range from approximately 1,800 to 2,500 square feet. This project and the future homes will be a welcome addition to the City of Highland and we all look forward seeing the proposal in the coming months.

Upper Santa Ana River Wash Plan moves one step forward!

Senator Dianne Feinstein this week introduced the *Santa Ana Wash Plan Land Exchange Act* to direct the San Bernardino Valley Water Conservation District and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to exchange land in the Santa Ana Wash, at the junction of the Santa Ana River and Mill Creek. The 4,500 acre Santa Ana Wash is currently a patchwork of land parcels owned by the water conservation district or BLM. The land exchange would help consolidate 1,347 acres of open space to preserve and protect habitat along the river's floodplain as part of the broader Santa Ana River Wash Plan (entitled the Upper Santa Ana River Habitat and Conservation Plan and Land Management Plan, or Wash Plan for short). The Wash Plan area is also occupied by two mining companies that extract material for cement and concrete projections. The bill also allows these commercial operations to continue in the Santa Ana Wash in an environmentally sensitive manner.



“Smarter land management will allow us to preserve sensitive habitat in the Santa Ana Wash while protecting the economic interest of the local community,” said Senator Feinstein. *“By consolidating pristine land and moving mining operations to more suitable land parcels, we can efficiently manage the Santa Ana Wash in a way that benefits everyone.”*

Under the Wash Plan, new land would be set aside for conservation purposes near land already managed by BLM. This bill lets the water conservation district exchange 310 acres of pristine land for 327 acres of degraded federal land managed by the BLM. In addition to the 1,347 acres of protected habitat, the Wash Plan benefits the City of Highland and its local water provider (East Valley Water District) by allowing the development of 15 miles of public use trails and roadways improvements, supports the recharge of local ground water aquifers through 77 recharge basins and allows mining operation to continue, supporting over \$36 million in local annual payroll (according to a Feinstein press release).

Administration

Emergency Preparedness - BUILD A KIT

Having a well-stocked disaster supply kit on hand before a disaster strikes will make anyone's life easier. A disaster may cause everyday necessities like food and clean water to become scarce and hard to come by. You may need to survive on your own after an emergency. This means having your own food, water and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for **at least** three days. A week is preferable. Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster but they cannot reach everyone immediately. You could get help in hours or it might take days. A well-stocked disaster supply kit should have the following items:

- Water – one gallon of water per person, per day
- Food – Canned goods, MRE's, freeze dried. Also include at least one manual can opener
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Sanitation Items - Moist towelettes, toilet paper, feminine hygiene products, garbage bags and plastic ties, soap/detergent and bleach.
- Basic tools – wrench, pliers, screw drivers, shovel, duct tape, etc.
- Cash and change
- A change of clothes, sturdy shoes, and rain protection for each person
- A sleeping bag and/or extra blankets
- Other supplies
- Cups, plates, bowls, utensils, foil
- Extra batteries
- Plastic sheeting
- Copies of important documents (Driver's license, passport, birth certificate, etc)
- Fire extinguisher
- Lighters and/or matches
- Extra medication
- Cash and credit cards



These are just the basics. Everyone's kit will be different because everyone has different needs. If you have an infant, then extra bottles, formula, and diapers would be necessary. Don't forget about your pets. They'll need food and water as well. Remember that a disaster can strike at any time, but the time to get prepared is now.
